### Flowers – Judged by Mavis Cotton

#### Class

- 1 3 dahlias of any one cultivar
- 2 3 asters of any one cultivar
- 3 3 stems of one variety of perennial or herbaceous flowers
- 4 3 stems of one variety of any annual
- 5 1 specimen rose
- 6 3 roses of any variety
- 7 My favourite garden flower
- 8 Hydrangea, 1 stem
- 9 3 stems of sweet peas
- 10 1 sunflower
- 11 1 pot plant – flowering or foliage
- 12 Top Vase - a vase of mixed flowering stems (criteria are set out in the Rules below)
- 13 50th anniversary of the Apollo 11 moon landing: – an exhibit composed of natural plant materials to commemorate 50 years of the moon landing. Size not to exceed height 70cm, width 46cm and depth 46cm. Accessories may be used
- 14 My Favourite Herb or Herbs – a display to your design not exceeding 46cm in width, depth and height
- 15 A hanging basket not to exceed 36cm in diameter



### Fruit – Judged by John Lock

#### Class

- 16 3 cooking apples
- 17 3 dessert apples
- 18 3 pears
- 19 Dish of 5 plums/damsons/greengages
- 20 Dish of 6 Blackberries
- 21 Dish of any other soft fruit
- 22 Any other fruit not specified in Classes 16-20 (contact me for numbers required)



### Vegetables – Judged by John Lock

#### Class

- 23 Truss of cherry tomatoes
- 24 4 tomatoes (not cherry)

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- 25 1 cucumber
- 26 2 courgettes for quality
- 27 6 french beans
- 28 6 runner beans
- 29 6 pods of peas including sugar snap or mange tout
- 30 3 beetroots
- 31 3 onions
- 32 2 peppers
- 33 3 chilli peppers
- 34 3 carrots
- 35 3 potatoes
- 36 Any vegetable not on the schedule (contact me for numbers required)
- 37 Top Tray – a collection of three types of vegetables (criteria are set out in the Rules below)
- 38 The longest runner bean
- 39 The strangest shaped vegetable



**Eggs** - Judged by Terry Hannam - see Rules below for criteria

Class

- 40 3 matching eggs
- 41 A single egg external (specify whether bantam, large fowl or other)
- 42 A single egg for quality internal (specify as above)
- 43 Pair, 1 large and 1 bantam any colour
- 44 Pair different colour same size
- 45 Photo, poultry related
- 46 A Scotch egg (you can use a store bought egg)



**Honey**

Class

- 47 1 jar of clear runny honey.
- 48 1 jar of granulated or creamed honey
- 49 A honey cake (minimum diameter 7in/18cm) (you can use stored bought honey)



**Domestic** – Judged by Elaine Pearson (Classes 50-60), Jon Deacon & Kevin Emerson (Class 61 & 62)

Class

- 50 1 jar of marmalade
- 51 1 jar of savoury preserve (chutney, jelly etc.)
- 52 1 jar of jam
- 53 1 jar of curd

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- 54 A chocolate and banana crater cake to commemorate the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Apollo 11 moon landing - **using the recipe at the end of the schedule.**
- 55 3 fruit scones
- 56 5 florentine biscuits
- 57 A savoury quiche (minimum diameter 7in/18cm)
- 58 A loaf of Soda Bread – ‘Freeform’ not in a tin, not to exceed 38cm
- 59 A coffee sponge cake (minimum diameter 7in/18cm)
- 60 5 cheese straws
- 61 An alcoholic drink: Beer/cider etc
- 62 An alcoholic drink: Wine/gin etc



**Art** – Judged by Renate West and Kelly Everett

Class

- 63 A portrait in any medium
- 64 A landscape in either oil or acrylics
- 65 An abstract work of art in any medium
- 66 A 3-dimensional sculpture
- 67 A drawing in charcoal, pencil, pen & ink or pastel
- 68 A still life, flowers or foliage in any medium



**Craft** – Judged by Renate West and Kelly Everett

Class

- 69 An item of embroidery or cross stitch
- 70 An item of crochet work or knitting
- 71 A sewn item (machine or hand)
- 72 An item of woodwork or ceramics
- 73 A handmade toy



**Photography** – Judged by Donald Sorterup

All photographs are not to exceed 10in x 8in/ 25cm x 20cm (mounting optional)

Class

- 74 Snowy scene
- 75 Sunset
- 76 Speed
- 77 Flora or fauna
- 78 A black and white photograph, any subject
- 79 Any subject – by children up to 18 years of age. Note – children can enter any of the other classes in this schedule if they so wish including the other photography classes.

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containing a total of between five and ten stems, taken from a minimum of two different kinds of plants. Please note that it is two different KINDS of plants; two varieties of the same plant are NOT two kinds.

\*The display will be judged out of a total of 35 points, split into; 25 points for the colour, form, condition, quality and freshness of the flowers on display, and 10 marks for the overall presentation and effect of the flowers in the vase. The vase will be viewed from all directions. Judging of the flowers should be to the normal rules used for other classes.

\*Stems must be showing flowers only; no seed heads or berries will be allowed.

\*The vase can be any shape and size and made from any material, but must be in proportion to the display. No marks are awarded for the vase itself.

\*No accessories whatsoever – such as bows and additional foliage – will be allowed. Foliage, which is growing naturally from the flowering stem, and still attached to that stem, will be allowed. Packing material – including floral foam – to keep the stems in place is allowed.

\*The winner of the Abbotts Ann Top Vase will receive a certificate plus a £3 garden gift voucher. The runner-up will receive a £2 garden gift voucher. Third place will receive a £1 garden gift voucher.

#### **NOTES FOR EXHIBITORS AND JUDGES**

\*Flowering stems can be taken from ANY flowering plant. The different kinds of plants need to be taken from different genera. For instance, pinks, carnations and sweet William – which are all dianthus – would not be classed as different kinds.

\*Only fresh, home-grown flowers can be used in the vase. No dried or silk flowers are allowed.

\*A vase, by definition, is any vessel that can be used to hold cut flowers and which is taller than it is wide at its widest point.

\*Judges should use their discretion when judging the Top Vase, bearing in mind that the entries may come from inexperienced exhibitors.

\*Judges and exhibitors should note that the display has to be viewed all round.

\*Any queries that may arise, regarding anything other than the above rules, should be referred to, and decided by the show officials.

#### **TOP TRAY COMPETITION**

\*The *Abbotts Ann Growers' Association* Top Tray class is for a collection of three types of vegetables taken from the following list of eight. The quantity of each vegetable required for the collection is given in brackets; carrots (3), cauliflowers (2), onions (3), parsnips (3), peas (6 pods), potatoes (3), runner beans (6 pods) tomatoes (6). Each type of vegetable will be judged out of a total of 20 points. This is split into three sections as follows: 7 points for size, shape and colour, 7 points for condition and 6 points for uniformity. The overall mark will be out of a total of 60.

\*All vegetables are to be displayed for effect. The vegetables must be displayed within an area measuring 45cm by 60cm (18 x 24 in), without bending any part of them. No part of any exhibit may exceed the size of the tray. A tray or board 45cm by 60 cm (18 x 24 in) can be used to display the vegetables, or the area can be simply marked on the staging. Where a tray has a lip or edge, it is the internal measurements that must not exceed 45cm by 60cm (18 x 24in).

\*A black cloth is permitted, and the tray may be painted. Parsley is allowed for garnishing, but no other foliage or accessories, such as plates, sand, rings etc will be allowed. Onion tops may be tied or whipped using raffia or string.

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#### **NOTES FOR EXHIBITORS AND JUDGES**

\*Carrots and parsnips must have foliage trimmed back to 7.5cm (3 in).

\*Peas and beans must be displayed with some stalk attached.

\*Tomatoes must be displayed with calyces (the green flower bud case).

\*Judges may handle exhibits, open pods etc to check for quality.

\*The tray, board or staging must not be cut or mutilated in any way at all – such as cutting holes for standing onions in.
